1260 Plain Bob Doubles

42½ minutes

Rung for the Southern District Quarter Peal fortnight.

A hundred years since augmentation.

An out of tune 5 cwt. 5 to an acceptable 9cwt 6 in A flat.

In George Buckler's book of 1856, Twenty- two Churches of Essex, there is a chapter on Shenfield It states that "In the Parish of Margaretting the Church in the Manor of Shenfield has 4 bells dated, 1626, 1637, 1664 and 1715". Later, in 1898, a treble was added to celebrate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. The result being a most out of tune ring. In July 1911 the offer of a new Tenor was accepted in the hope that it would improve the tonal effect.

A survey revealed that both bells and wooden frame to be totally insecure and ringing stopped immediately. Just two months later, in September, after fund raising, a faculty was obtained for a new ring of 6 in a steel frame. Warners of Cripplegate were given the contract at a cost of £270. The schedule of work to be completed by 9th December just 5 months from start to finish.

The front 5 were put in the melting pot to create, with a new tenor, a 9cwt. ring of 6 in Ab. To retain a link with the past the new front 5 have cast on them the inscriptions of their predecessors.

Saturday 23rd December 1911 was the day of the dedication service followed by High Tea at the Eagle and Child. The speeches included one urging the local band to take up the art of Change Ringing and to join the Essex Association who would be glad to help them progress. There was also a demonstration of hand bell ringing by a group from South Tottenham.

Christmas Day 1911 the bells were sounding out once again.

The Ringing Room At the time of augmentation in 1911 it was more spacious than we see it today. Initially all ropes fell directly to the floor. The strengthening steelwork was added 17 years later in 1928. Hence the awkwardness of ringing the 2nd and 3rd did not exist before 1928. Flooring was added after installation there being no trap doors in floor or ceiling.

1926 the Bearings The Warner Bearings were showing signs of wear and needed replacing. Boswell's of Ipswich undertook the work, again with plain bearings, at a cost of £25 plus £1 for some blocks to help reduce wear on the ropes.

1927 the Tower Steelwork Death Watch beetles had attacked the structure of the Tower and the affected timbers were removed. The additional strengthening steelwork, that we see to-day, was added bedded in concrete at ground level, attached to the main wooden vertical beams it goes right up to the 1911 steel frame. With the cross bracing in the Ringing Room it gives the much needed support and rigidity to the bells. In 1928 H E Stratton designed the steelwork (£105), Messrs. John Butler bought the steelwork (£131.17.5) & erected it (£329.12.10) the safety certificate issued in October. The result is far less room for ringers & the 2nd and 3rd ropes fall directly onto beams.

In the 1970s Harry Turner was asked, by the Probation Board, to find work for a group of youngsters. A special mix of red paint was purchased and the frame given a completely new coat

In the 1990s A family of Glis-glis (fat, or edible doormice!) were evicted from the Tower. Also the vertical wooden ladder for access to the Ringing Room was replaced by the dog-leg staircase we see today. Strictly speaking, a ladder, not a stair because of its angle.

2010 The clappers Complete overhaul by Taylor's of Loughborough. Cost, £873.02

2011 April Taylor's visited to discuss future work. Their comments were that overall the ring is in excellent condition, an attribute to those who, over the years, have maintained them.

Future work A faculty has obtained to mount the 5th & 6th on ball bearings. The wheels to have new soles & flanges. The soles to be of the, wider, modern design. And it is hoped that Taylor's can complete the work before Christmas 2011. That is in time to celebrate 100 years since augmentation.

Improving your Basic Skills/First Steps in Plain Hunt
To join this group you should be happy ringing a bell Rounds and you may have rung some Call Changes.

Plain Hunt/Trebling to Plain Methods on 5, 6 or 7
To join this group you need to have good bell control and to have started ringing plain hunt on 4 or 5.

Plain Bob Doubles and Minor
To join this group you need to be able to ring the treble to touches of Bob Doubles without assistance.

Grandsire Doubles
To join this group you need to be able to ring the treble to Grandsire Doubles or Bob Minor without assistance.

The application form is on page 10 and needs to be submitted by November 4th.

Notes from EACR Management Committee Meeting 8 October 2011

1. Change Ringing for the Future

There is a meeting, organised by the Central Council, on recruitment and training to be held on Saturday 12 November 2011 in Warwickshire. The conference is open to anyone who is passionate about the future of the Exercise, especially those who have an active interest in teaching ringing, to express their views about the long-term prospects for change ringing. All organisations affiliated to the Central Council are asked to be represented. There were no volunteers from the committee, but Brian Meads and Fred Bone will both be present and it was agreed that Fred would represent the EACR. Details are on the CCCBR website.

2. Annual dinner

This was successful with 95 attendees, at an overall deficit of approx £20. It is planned to hold a dinner in 2012.

The dinner was the first event organised by the Social Committee, under the leadership of Andrew Brewster; Hilary Donoghue is our district rep. It was agreed that the group would arrange the dinner and the Friday evening entertainment at the Ringing Course.

3. Treasurer's report

Proposed to increase the charge for adults attending the ringing course by £5, to £45.

There will be no increase in subscriptions for 2012

There is a new expenses claim form available on the website; this is to be used for all future expenses claims to meet statutory requirements.

Membership forms: the new forms must now be used as the Association is required to have up-to-date addresses for Gift Aid purposes. District Treasurers are encouraged to keep a database of members' addresses, as recommended by The Charity Commissioners.

4. Education officer's report

Helpers are still needed for the training day on 26th November.

Ringing course: alternative venues are being sought for the course, as

there have been problems with Honywood school in Coggeshall. Two options are being considered, but it is complex as a large number of towers are needed within a reasonable travelling distance. The 2012 course will almost certainly be in Coggeshall.

5. Newsletter

Items for the newsletter are still needed! Please send any copy to the newsletter editor

6. Publicity

Organisations are being asked to ring for the Olympics at 8am on Fri 22nd July 2012, for 3 mins as 'loudly and quickly as possible' (!) as part of a nationwide celebration.

The opening ceremony is 27th July and it is hoped towers will ring for that event.

Extra funds were requested for publicity events; this was discussed and it was proposed that funds of £450 would be available for 2012 only. Any further funding requests would go to the AGM or another committee meeting.

7. Webmaster

More input from Districts is requested as there is little information being sent to the Webmaster.

Generic e-mail addresses have been set up for 38 towers, and tower correspondents are encouraged to use this facility.

8. Technical advisor

Paul Bray is standing down as technical advisor with immediate effect and a replacement is sought, initially on a temporary basis until a new advisor can be elected at the next AGM.

The Technical advisor also convenes the Grants Committee so the responsibility for this now defaults to the Master until the AGM.

9. Grant applications

£3K for Great Tey agreed, towards re-tuning and re-hanging

£2.5K for Harwich refurbishment agreed

Willingale have now received a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund; agreed that EACR would fund up to 10% of the bell-related costs, to a maximum of £6K.

MINUTES: District Meeting at Prittlewell, Saturday 17th September 2011

1. Welcome & Thanks

The Master welcomed all present. We had a few visitors earlier on in the day – John Everett from Boreham, Keith Gatcombe from Abbots Langley and Alan and Maureen Cansdale from Halstead (Northern District).

The Master thanked Father Shaun Conlon for taking the service and for the use of the bells, the organist Warren Symes, and to the Prittlewell ringers for the wonderful tea.

The service touch was a Stedman Triples and was rung by Cathryn Corns, Hilary Donoghue, Catherine Gisby, John Harpole, Gordon Lucas, Stephen Nash, David Sloman and Simon Greenwood.

2. Sign the Roll Book

The Master invited everyone to sign the roll book and to indicate on the sheet provided those who had been asked to record apologies for absence. In the roll book were two cards for members to sign – one was a get well card to Renée Page-Jones (Hutton) who had been admitted to hospital and the other was a golden wedding anniversary card to Dorothy and Vic Dale (South Weald).

3. Minutes of Previous Meeting

The Minutes of the previous meeting held at Bentley Common on 19th March 2011 were printed in the April/May 2011 District Newsletter and circulated at the meeting. As there were no amendments the Minutes were signed as a true copy.

4. Matters Arising

The District Training Day on 2nd April was a course for Plain Bob Doubles and Grandsire Doubles and was a very successful event.

On 12th-16th June was our Quarter Peal Fortnight. Of the twenty five towers in the District, all except two had quarters attempted in them, although six quarters were lost. There were 22 quarters scored in eighteen different towers and there were a number of firsts. Andrew Beech mentioned North Ockendon had rung a quarter peal and had given Rowena Marshall the donation for the quarter but unfortunately this was not published with the others. John Harpole is to speak to Rowena about this.

The 11th June was the District Outing to Cambridgeshire. Twenty six members visited various towers in the county. All Saints, Cottenham, St Mary, Burwell and Ely Cathedral to name but a few. Again, a very successful outing.

The 21st May was our District Striking Competition. Five towers took part with Downham coming first and Langdon Hills coming second.

The Association Finals took place at Rayne (6) Downham came 7th and Langdon Hills came 9th. The Eight Bell Competition took place at Great Bardfield where the Southern District was placed first. The trophy is at present at Bentley Common tower.

The Essex Country Show took place at Barleylands, Billericay, between 10th and 11th September. Seventeen people had approached Tracey Southgate, Association PRO, showing an interest in learning to ring. Alison Nash, Secretary, has already passed on the details to those towers who would benefit, namely Downham – 6 people, Rayleigh – 1 person, Hutton – 1 person, Basildon – 4 people, Rettendon – 4 people and Prittlewell – 1 person. A big “thank you” to Andy Martin and several other helpers who helped, not only on the two days, but also setting up the equipment the Friday before.

5. Correspondence

A letter had been received from Ray Jones concerning Shenfield bells. A faculty notice has been submitted to widen the sole boards and deepen the edge boards so that the sallies will not slip wheel. The fifth and sixth bells will be temporary removed to allow ball bearings to be fitted. Although Taylors of Loughborough will be carrying out the heavy work local manpower is helping out. All monetary costs have been met by Shenfield church. It is hoped on 23rd December a celebratory peal can be rung as on this date it will be the centenary of the six bells.

The Secretary, Alison Nash, had received an email concerning the Association Training Day to be held on Saturday 26th November. The course is to be held in the South East District starting at 9.45am at Writtle. The course topics are: Improving basic skills/first steps in Plain Hunt, Plain Hunt/Trebling to Plain Methods on 5, 6, and 7 bells, Plain Bob Doubles & Minor and Grandsire Doubles. If there is anyone who wishes to be a student, please contact Liz Rayner, Association Training Officer, direct. Students will be on a first come, first served basis. If there is anyone who would like to be a helper on the course, again, please contact Liz Rayner stating whether you can help in the morning, afternoon or all day. All helpers gratefully accepted.

6. Election of New Members

(a) Ringing Members

Jonathan Mills (Holy Cross, South Ockendon, Catholic Church) proposed by Simon Greenwood, seconded by Cathy Merivale.

(b) There were no Friend members of the Association elected.

(c) There were no non-resident members of the Association elected.

7. Training

If anyone would like training of any kind or perhaps a particular tower is struggling with a method and they need a day of intensive training please contact Cathryn Corns, District Education Officer.

8. Future Events

The Master ran through the remainder of the District Programme for 2011:

The next District Surprise Practice is on 22nd September at South Weald. The next District Afternoon Practice at Grays on 15th October.

Hilary Donoghue spoke about the Annual Dinner at Chelmsford on 1st October. She stated that our district was the least represented and that it would be wonderful if more people from our district were present.

The next District Meeting will be at North Ockendon on 19th November when the Call Change Competition will be held before hand, 2.30pm start. The Master, John Harpole, tried to encourage more bands to take part. Don't be put off by the anti clockwise ring at North Ockendon. Let's try to get another tower name on the shield.

On 10th December there is the District Carol Service at Rochford. Ringing starts at 3pm.

On to 2012 – the Annual District Meeting is being held at Rayleigh (8). Ringing starts at 3pm.

9. Apologies for Absence

There were 6 apologies for absence. These can be seen in the Attendance Record.

10. Any Other Business

At Holy Cross, South Ockendon, Catholic Church, the building work has started. The wooden ceiling has been installed and so has the two trap doors. Nicholsons are hoping to start installing the bells on 17th October and to finish around 10 days later. Therefore the bells should be available at the beginning of November. There will be 8 bells, the tenor will weigh 3 cwt, 3 quarters and 9lbs and the treble 1½ cwt. As the bells should be ready by the November meeting on 19th November, Simon Greenwood, asked whether, instead of ringing at North Ockendon after the Call Change Competition and meeting, would we like to go to South Ockendon. The meeting accepted his offer.

Beth Johnson is in urgent need of photographs which can be used on the front of the District Newsletter and other material – anniversaries, birthdays, outings, etc. will also be gratefully received. The next newsletter will be out at the end of October. All material needs to be with Beth Johnson by 15th October.

Mark Robbins, District Treasurer, reminded everyone of the new Essex Association Rules. All subscriptions are due on 1st January each year. He quoted “Those members whose annual subscriptions are not paid by 30th April each year shall not participate in or vote at meetings or ring peals for the Association until the subscription is paid”. This now includes all those over 65 years old. He also stated that it is a condition of membership he will need the addresses of all those who are Association Members. There was a small discussion on this point. As a reminder the subscriptions are £8 per adult member and junior members £4.

Penny and David Sloman’s son, Richard, will soon be working for Care International in Bangladesh. They are entering a 10km (6.1 miles) sponsored walk soon and would be grateful if anyone would sponsor them.

Peter Sloman advised DVD’s were available of the installation of St Mary’s Prittlewell bells at a price of £7.50 if anyone was interested.

Alison Nash, District Secretary, advised the meeting the district officers will soon be organising the 2012 district diary. Please feel free to give her any suggestions on where to visit in the district or what to do that may be different. Any suggestions would be helpful.
